## Reaching, Nurturing and Growing

From [Christ] the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work. EPHESIANS 4:16 (NIV)

As a pastor, I am sometimes asked to identify my favorite passage in the Bible. This is a difficult question for me to answer, since I have many favorite passages. When it comes to the subject of the church, however, Ephesians 4:16 is my favorite. I love it so, because it employs the oft-used biblical image of the church as a body. For me, "the body" is a fitting image for the church. Like a body, the church is composed of many members, all of which must work together in order for the body to remain healthy and strong. Like a body, the movement of the church is governed by the head, which is Jesus Christ. Being a healthy body requires reaching outward, looking inward, and growing together.

Let's consider ourselves, and our own lives. Every day we spend a considerable amount of time <u>reaching outward</u>, for that is what a healthy person does. We go to work, and to school. We spend time with family and friends. We also participate in the ministries of our church, which calls us to extend Christ's ministry of self-giving love to our community and our world. Reaching outward is essential for the life of a healthy person, and it is essential for the life of a healthy church.

Every day we also spend a considerable amount of time <u>nurturing inward</u>. Introspection and self-care is essential to the growth of a healthy person. No matter how busy our lives may be, we ignore things like proper exercise, nutrition, and rest at our own peril. The traditional spiritual disciplines of prayer, study, and worship are essential to our growth as Christians. In order to be healthy and strong, we simply must attend to the needs within.

The result of reaching outward and nurturing inward is **growing together** as a body. The Apostle Paul is right when he says that the body grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work. This fall, our Church Council is working to revise our vision statement according to these three expressions of bodily movement and growth. It seems to us that everything that we do as a church can be seen as reaching outward, nurturing inward, or growing together. You will hear more about this vision as we move into the excitement of another fall season. I'll see you in church!

In the SIL program, emphasis is placed on developing social and life skills, obtaining and maintaining employment and/or volunteer work, completing an education plan, staying safe and having healthy relationships, and identifying secure and affordable housing.

6 pm - Dinner in Asbury Center 6:30 pm - Activity for all ages Children's Choir, Youth Discussion Groups, Adult Study and Discussion



## Four Principles of Biblical Stewardship

Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service, you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already.

C. S. Lewis, Mere Christianity

What does stewardship look like in our lives today? Unfortunately many Christians only associate the idea of stewardship with sermons they have heard about church budgets and building programs. But for me, the idea of biblical stewardship is about something much more expansive. I believe it is where the concepts of faith, work and economics intersect. Consider the following four important principles about biblical stewardship:

#### 1. The principle of ownership.

The psalmist begins the Psalm 24 with, "The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it." In the beginning of Genesis, God creates everything and puts Adam in the Garden to work it and to take care of it. It is clear that human beings were created to work and that work is the stewardship of all of the creation that God has given. This is the fundamental principle of biblical stewardship. God owns everything, we are simply managers or administrators acting on God's behalf. Therefore, stewardship expresses our obedience regarding the administration of everything God has placed under our control, which is all encompassing. Stewardship is the commitment of one's self and possessions to God's service, recognizing that we do not have the right of control over our property or ourselves. Echoing Deuteronomy 8:17, we might say: "My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me." But Deuteronomy 8:18 counsels us to think otherwise:

"Remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth."

#### 2. The principle of responsibility.

Although God gives us "all things richly to enjoy," nothing is ours. Nothing really belongs to us. God owns everything; we're responsible for how we treat it and what we do with it. While we complain about our rights here on earth, the Bible constantly asks, "What about your responsibilities? Owners have rights; stewards have responsibilities." We are called as God's stewards to manage that which belongs to God. While God has graciously entrusted us with the care, development, and enjoyment of everything he owns as his stewards, we are responsible to manage his holdings well and according to his desires and purposes.

#### 3. The principle of accountability.

A steward is one who manages the possessions of another. We are all stewards of the resources, abilities and opportunities that God has entrusted to our care, and one day each one of us will be called to give an account for how we have managed what the Master has given us.

This is the maxim taught by the Parable of the Talents. God has entrusted authority over the creation to us and we are not allowed to rule over it as we see fit. We are called to exercise our dominion under the watchful eye of the Creator managing his creation in accord with the principles he has established. Like the servants in the Parable of the Talents, we will be called to give an account of how we have administered everything we have been given, including our time, money, abilities, information, wisdom, relationships, and authority. We will all give account to the rightful owner as to how well we managed the things he has entrusted to us.

#### 4. The principle of reward.

In Colossians 3:23-24 Paul writes: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving." The Bible shows us in the parables of the Kingdom that faithful stewards who do the master's will with the master's resources can expect to be rewarded incompletely in this life, but fully in the next. We all should long to hear the master say what he exclaims in Matthew 25:21: "Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!" As Christians in the 21st century, we need to embrace this larger biblical view of stewardship, which goes beyond church budgets or building projects, though important; it connects everything we do with what God is doing in the world. We need to be faithful stewards of all God has given us within the opportunities presented through his providence to glorify him, serve the common good and further God's Kingdom.

## Stewardship Discovery Coming to MLUMC

This fall, our Church will be working with Horizons Stewardship on a Stewardship Discovery program. This program, which is designed to do an in-depth analysis of the stewardship messaging, practices, and protocols used by our Church, will hopefully result in our congregation having a better understanding of the spiritual work that is done through regular, special, and legacy giving. A representative from Horizons Stewardship will be working with the Finance Committee on this endeavor. Opportunities will exist for members of our congregation not only to provide input into the program but also to grow in the knowledge of how financial gifts made to our Church are used. A more detailed description of the program and its goals will provided to all members and friends of our Church shortly. The Finance Committee is excited about what this program will bring to our Church – hopefully you will be too!



Our theme for the 2015-2016 church year was Casting a Wider Net.

Just a portion of our many successful activities during the church year demonstrate that we truly expanded our ministries:

Four first time community outreach activities took place. Our first Fall Festival attracted many new families to the various activities in our building and parking lot on a September afternoon. We walked through the nearby Dormont neighborhood singing Christmas carols and were well received by the community. Our first ever Good Friday Fish Fry attracted hundreds of people and raised significant funds for our food pantry. Our first ever June Barbecue attracted many community members and this event also raised funds for our food pantry. We know the June event resulted in at least one family attending worship for the first time.

A new young adult Sunday School Class began in the spring with 14 members. Four members are new to the church.

A new pictorial directory will help us get to know one another, especially our new members.

Our conference apportionment was fully paid for 2015, and thousands of additional funds were donated to a wide variety of mission projects.

The newly expanded Food Lift program is supplying many pounds of food for the needy. Several new people joined this program during the past year.



MLUMC's youth traveled to Marion, VA on mission to help low income families with home repairs and renovations.

The youth mission trip to Marion, Virginia was extremely successful, and it marked the 47th consecutive year that the youth have represented our church in the mission field.

A committee was formed to plan as many interesting topics as possible for Faith For Today. Overall attendance for this summer series has increased.

Our building was enhanced through the successful completion of our Capital Campaign. The parsonage received much needed upgrades and the sanctuary electrical system was improved, to name just a few of many projects completed in our beautiful facility.

Throughout the last year and a half we made great strides in improving our building thanks to your faithful support. At the end of July 2016 we collected 98% of the pledged support to the Capital Campaign and many more gifts above and beyond the original pledge. ## Why Worship?

A seasoned preacher once told a class of graduating seminarians: "Always remember that about half the people in front of you on any given Sunday morning almost decided not to come!"

Why do *you* go to worship? Why get up on a beautiful Sunday morning – when there are lots of good possibilities to fill your day—and head out to a service of worship? I need to ask myself this question these days as a retired preacher—as one no longer actively preaching or leading worship!

Let me suggest some reasons why you might decide to be there.

You might be there because you want to be part of an ancient/future community. Someone has written, "At church, I do not want to be entertained. I do not want to be the target of someone's marketing. I want to be asked to participate in the life of an ancient/future community." Ours is a culture of immediacy—of the "right now." In corporate worship, we find ties with the ancient past and the promised future. Worship is one place we connect with something larger than self.

You might be there to become reacquainted with our sacred story. Today it is so easy to become disconnected: sports, technology, weekend getaways, frenetic busyness. Plus: we live in a time of growing biblical illiteracy. One analyst suggests that In America 75% of those under age 30 have no Christian memory! Bill Wilson (founder of AA) tells of a transformed friend: "He was much more inwardly reorganized. He was on a different footing, new soil, in a new place." We need worship to put us on a different footing, in new soil, in a new place.

You might be there to join with like minded others. Be with those who love God and who are trying to be followers of Jesus—even in the midst of doubts, chaos, confusion, and great uncertainty. Be with others who want to believe but cannot—yet! Be with others who want to hold on to an incredible hope. Be with others who want to try to walk with Jesus.

You might be there to receive some life guidance for the week. The church is a sending place. It is a reminding time for what it means to be a follower of Jesus. I have always loved the exterior church sign which reads, "This church lives in the world, hopes in Jesus Christ, and meets in this building."

You might be there to participate in a great joy—from the opening hymn to the closing chorus. Psalm 100 reads, "Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise." Or Psalm 122:1 (the first Bible verse I ever remember learning), "I was glad when they said unto me, 'Let us go up to the house of the Lord.'"

So if you are gathered in worship with others because you want to be part of an ancient/future community, because you want to re-hear and reinforce the sacred story, because you want to be with those who are on the same journey, because you want to be reminded of what it means to live faithfully in the world, and because you want some deep soul-stretching celebration, you have come to the right place. And in the right spirit. And for the right reasons.

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## MLUMC'S Wholistic Health Outreach Ministry on Gender Differences in Medical Treatment

"There are different kinds of service, but we serve the same Lord. God works in different ways, but it is the same God who does the work in all of us." I Corinthians 12:5,6 NLT

When diagnosed with the same illness, historically men and women were given the same prescriptions and procedures. Does that make sense? You know you are different and now, so do researchers, pharmaceutical companies, and physicians. In the last decade, they have begun to look at genetic differences between men and women and how those differences impact treatments and procedures. They have discovered that levels of estrogen and testosterone as well as differences in risk-taking behavior impact the tendency for certain illnesses, levels of severity, and treatment of choice.

Genetics cause differences in weight, size, and body fat which impact how medications are processed, dosage, and effectiveness. Because of physical differences, women tend to require smaller doses than men. The level of sex hormones in men and women can impact a medication's effectiveness as well as the size of the liver or kidney that processes the medication. In both situations dosage adjustments may be required. For example some antibiotics tend to be more effective in women while anesthesia tends to be longer lasting in men. These differences can cause challenges for physicians looking for the right therapeutic dose.

Previous research was conducted on men while newer studies are concentrating on women's health, risk factors, and treatment options. Results show that women have more headaches than men, delayed cardiac problems, higher risk for diabetes from smoking, and greater difficulty with breaking the smoking habit. The good news is that women tend to seek health care before men, especially for mental illness.

Studies on the treatment of health issues in women continue. If you have a health concern, ask your physician about new options and recommendations for women.
