The Benefits of Giving

"Each one should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." 2 CORINTHIANS 9:7

We're entering a time of the year when "giving" is a major theme. This month it's Thanksgiving, and next month it's Christmas. Both holidays have something to do with giving and receiving good gifts. At Thanksgiving, we give thanks to God, who is ultimately the giver of all that we receive. The Bible is clear that the best way to respond to God's generosity is through some generous giving of our own.

This fall, our church has been celebrating the fact that God has blessed us with 1,000 local members (residing in Allegheny County), who all could potentially become involved in our 100 ministries, toward the fulfillment of our 1 mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. You will hear this mantra repeated a lot around here these days – "1,000 members supporting 100 ministries for 1 mission." That is our vision of who we are called to be as a Christian congregation in the world today. May God transform this vision into reality through our efforts this year.

Where would our church be today without the fine example of our forbearers in the faith, whose generous response to God's call has laid the foundation for our ministries today? Now it is our turn to lay the foundation for present and future ministry in this place. History and Scripture are both very clear – if you want to grow spiritually, then you must be generous in your giving. This is the best way to give our thanks. "Each of you must give," says Paul, "as each of you has made up your mind." God wants us to grow in trust. God wants us to learn to give. God wants us to risk growth in grace by giving back to God in proportion to God's giving to us. In all areas of your life – your time, your talent, and your finances – if you are currently giving at the five percent level, can you increase it to seven percent? If you are giving at one percent, can you increase to two or three percent? Growth is the hope in the heart of God for you and for me! The question for each of us to ask is this: What is the next rung on the stewardship ladder for me? Giving is an act of trust for you and for me. As we grow in our giving to God, our faith deepens, and we open up new opportunities for spiritual advancement in the years ahead. Do you want to really give thanks this season, and move to a higher level in your spiritual life? Giving is an essential key which unlocks the door to spiritual growth for each one of us.

Introducing Friedenskirche in Zwickau and Our Partnership

Our partner church is located in the southern part of eastern Germany near the Ore Mountains (Erzgebirge), famous for silver mining and for the woodcarvings of

nutcrackers, smokers, and Christmas pyramids. It is also located near the cultural capitals of Dresden and Weimar. The influences of Luther, Goethe and German history are particularly strong in this part of Germany. More recently, this area was under communist domination, which strongly affected the life of our partner church and its members. In 2017 the area will be celebrating 500 years since Luther began the Reformation!

Most Protestants in Germany belong to the Evangelical Church (main protestant church) which requires a church tax of its members. The Friedenskirche, on the other hand, is a minority church because it is of the Methodist "sect". It is called a "free" church because it requires no tax of its members. Our Zwickau partner church is the largest in the conference with a membership of approximately 600. Since the fall of communism the nature of our partner church's work and the goals of its mission have changed. Its leaders are dealing with an aging congregation, and the church must appeal to a young generation that is mistrustful of organizations. The church music programs and the outreach to the community and to the many refugees have been helpful.

MLUMC has visited Zwickau five times; 1996, 2000, 2004, 2009 and 2013. Zwickau has visited us five times also;



1998, 2002, 2006, 2011 and 2015, in addition to a pastoral working experience in the summer of 2000 when Pastor Stephan Ringeis came with his family and worked at our church. Pastor Lutz Brueckner and his wife Martina led groups to Pittsburgh in the summers of 2011 and 2015. Our new partner pastor will be Christian Posdzich. MLUMC's pastors, Rev. Dr. Harvey, Rev. Hecht, Rev. Dr. Miller, Rev. Warman, and now Rev. Strandburg, have enthusiastically participated in our exchange visits and hostings since 1996.

The Zwickau Committee, a part of the Mission Commission, has started plans for our June 2017 Zwickau trip. The itinerary will include 10-12 days with Zwickau host families, a visit to a city like Berlin before Zwickau and a visit to town in southern Germany after Zwickau. Because of the long hosting experience, the costs are very minimal. While in Zwickau the group will visit various tourist sites and participate in work projects with our partners.

Our next group meeting will be in January, but sign-ups and deposits are beginning now. A \$300 deposit check made out to MLUMC, *Zwickau* written on the memo line, will secure your seat on the plane. Because of airplane/hotel reservations, the sign-up deadline will be at the beginning of January. All ages are welcome—we would like a broad intergenerational span. A conversational German language class has begun this month with another to follow later.
