Back to the Roots

Most of you who are reading this newsletter are aware that our church has enjoyed a partnership with a United Methodist congregation in eastern Germany for more than twenty years. Throughout that time, our parishioners have exchanged visits approximately every two years. In 2015, we welcomed Pastor Lutz Brückner, his wife Martina, and several members of their congregation to MLUMC. This year, it is our turn. I will be joined by my wife Kathy, and by several of our members, as we travel to the Evangelische-methodistische Friedenskirche in Zwickau. We will meet their new pastor, Christian Posdzich, and have the opportunity to renew many old acquaintances in Zwickau. I would invite you to join us in worship on June 18th, as our group is commissioned for this exchange trip, which will last from that evening through July 5th. Together, our two churches will gather around the theme, "Back to the Roots: Daring to do a New Thing." We began this emphasis in 2015, as our two churches learned about our early Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren roots, as we traveled to historic sites in rural Pennsylvania, Maryland, and in the city of Baltimore. This year, we will build upon this theme as we examine the roots of our faith on the continent of Europe, in commemoration of the 500th Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation.



Just think about what our fore bearers in the faith accomplished as they allowed God to work through them. On October 31st, 1517, Martin Luther had the courage to nail his 95 Theses upon the door of the Wittenberg Castle church. This act sparked a great reformation that ultimately inspired other persons to act upon their faith. Over two centuries later, John Wesley shared a similar motivation, as he inspired a great revival in his own country and church. Others who shared his passion, would carry this work around the world.

One of these people was the German pastor Philip William Otterbein. Ordained a pastor in the year 1749 at his home church in the town of Dillenburg, Germany, Otterbein could never have foreseen that he would be stepping off a ship in New York harbor just a few years later to begin an exciting new work in a "strange" new land known as Pennsylvania. It is estimated that 90,000 Germans were living in Pennsylvania at that time – about half of the state's entire population. Many of them lived in communities without pastors or places of worship. For twenty years, appeals had come from America for more ministers. Philip William Otterbein responded to that call. He dared to do something great with God, and as a result the seeds of United Methodism were planted and nurtured in this country.

This summer, we will hear more of this history, as we travel "back to the roots" with our German friends. We will celebrate our reformation history in the very land where it all began, in the land of Luther's courageous stand, Wesley's Moravian influence, and Otterbein's missionary call. Through it all, we will ask ourselves the question - What is it that we shall dare to do in our day, with God's help? It's a question that is well worth asking.

Now The Food Lift™ is also delivering fresh fruits and produce donated from area businesses to another Allegheny County service that shelters women and children without homes, Womanspace East, Inc. Case manager Sara Minder has sent a thank-you letter. She describes the location of Womanspace East as a "Food Desert." Here is her letter:



Thank you so much for your generous donation of fresh fruits and vegetables to Womanspace East, Inc.

As you know, needy families and individuals in our community go without proper food, shelter and essential medical care every day due to a variety of factors including low wages, job loss, injuries, illness, or domestic violence. While all of us are susceptible to hard times, women and children are at the most risk, and they makeup the largest number of clients we serve.

With the generous support of people like you, we will be able to help many of these families and individuals to meet essential daily nutritional needs, as we are located in an area known as a "Food Desert." Typically, health options are not easily accessible within walking distance for families, or affordable to families on a fixed income.

Mission Trip to Haiti



Utilizing funds from the Harold Heard Endowment, Mt. Lebanon Methodist Church was able to continue a long standing connection to the people on the island of Haiti. Clark and Mary Remington went on a mission trip to work with the Methodist, Thomas Food Project in Arachaie, Haiti from March 6 to March 13, 2017.

They arrived in the midst of demonstrations in that area. Nevertheless, Mary walked about the neighborhood distributing the underwear, toothpaste, toothbrushes, and other items that our congregation donated. There was even a soccer ball donated and happily received. Additionally, Mary with some help from two husky Haitian boys constructed a bio-sand filter in a family's yard to provide clean water.

Clark spent his time in the schools training teachers. Even though the schools were closed due to the demonstrations, many teachers came anyway. The teachers were eager to improve their skills. Another church mission trip is being considered for 2018. Volunteers are needed to construct bio-sand filters, routine maintenance, teaching children educational games, teacher training, small business training, and distributing donated goods.

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MLUMC'S Wholistic Health Outreach Ministry on Summer Safety

"For everything there is a season, a time for every activity under heaven." Ecclesiastes 3:1 NLT

After an unpredictable winter and spring, everyone is anxious for summer and the activities that take us outdoors. To be sure you enjoy all that summer has to offer, remember to be observant and practice safety measures. Follow these tips when making your plans:

- Camping Be sure to plan for unexpected weather, carry plenty of water if hiking, take a map/GPS to prevent getting lost, wear comfortable walking shoes, wear a hat, use sunscreen and insect repellant, and wear a whistle in case you get lost.
- Swimming or Boating Drowning can occur in less than 2 inches of water so teach your children to swim, wear properly fitting flotation devices, keep children out of hot tubs (they get dangerously overheated), use the buddy system, dive only in areas marked for diving, watch for shallow depths in lakes, and supervise all activity.
- Fireworks Explosions of any kind are dangerous so handle with care, keep sparklers outside and at arm's length (they can reach 1,800 degrees), have a bucket of water nearby in case of fire, don't allow children to handle them before or after firing, and keep frightened pets indoors.
- Bicycling Head injuries are common so protect children with properly fitting helmets, replace ones that have hit a hard surface, wear bright clothing for visibility, tie loose pant legs to prevent tangling in the chain, teach the rules of the road, never wear headphones, and maintain the bike (inflate the tires, oil the chain, adjust the handlebars, replace worn out brakes, and adjust the seat).
- Sun Exposure Sun damage is cumulative (children gather 50% to 80% of their lifetime exposure before 18) and cause wrinkles, sunburns, cataracts, damage to the immune system, and skin cancer. Be extra careful with skin protection if you have very fair skin/hair, a family history of moles, a family history of skin cancer, or take medicine that causes increased sun sensitivity.
