

Help Wanted: Volunteer Church Night Monitors

MLUMC is in need of a few volunteers to stay overnight in the church to monitor the smoke/fire alarm system, due to a lightening strike that disabled the fire alarm system a few weeks ago. The system notified the Dormont Fire Department anytime the church had a smoke related alarm. As a temporary solution until the system is replaced, 16 smoke alarms have been placed around the church. However, the smoke alarms do not notify the fire department any time an alarm is triggered, and so the church is required to have someone in the property at night to check on the smoke alarms.

A makeshift bedroom for volunteers has been set up in room 105, the Network classroom. It is equipped with a mattress, reading chair, light, alarm clock and WIFI. A volunteer would need to sleep there overnight and walk around to monitor the smoke alarms once in the evening and once in the morning. The volunteer should arrive at the church between 9-11 pm and stay until 5:30-7:30 am.

A DISCUSSION ON SUICIDE AMONG LGBTQ YOUTH

SUNDAY, JULY 21, 7 PM ASBURY CENTER

Over 18% of LGBTQ people ages 13 to 24, and 29% of transgender and people who do not identify as masculine or feminine young people attempted suicide in the past 12 months. That's according to a report released June 2019 by The Trevor Project, a suicide prevention and crisis intervention organization for LGBTQ youth. You are invited to a discussion on this mental health crisis to be held Sunday evening, July 21 at 7 PM.

The keynote speaker for A Discussion on Suicide Among LGBTQ Youth is the president of PFLAG Pittsburgh, Mitchell Hortert. PFLAG is a non-profit organization that provides support, education and advocacy to families, friends, allies and members of the LGBTQ community. Mitchell R. Hortert, MSW, is a community leader, advocate, and educator. He has held trainings and speaking engagements on topics that range from working with families with children who identify as LGBTQ to child welfare, across Pennsylvania and nationwide.

Before the presentation, desserts will be served, donated and/or prepared by members of MLUMC's **Do No Harm.** The suggested price for this event is a donation of \$10, with all proceeds benefiting an LGBTQ youth suicide prevention program.
