The Gathering: A Fresh Expression in Worship

A new modern worship service is coming to Mt. Lebanon United Methodist Church. On December 1, the first Sunday of Advent, *The Gathering* will be launched. All are invited to this fresh expression and experience in worship taking place on Sundays from 8:30 to 9:30 am in Asbury Center.

The primary preacher for the service will be current Assistant to the Pastor Scott Miller. By the time *The Gathering* is launched, Bishop Cynthia Moore Koikoi will have appointed him as a part-time local pastor, serving as an associate pastor at MLUMC. He and Pastor Tom Strandburg will coordinate the service's message with Pastor Tom's sermons. In this way Mt. Lebanon United Methodist Church will have a unified voice glorifying God during three services each Sunday.

The music for *The Gathering* will be arranged and performed in a modern style, different from the church's more traditional music. Singer and keyboardist B.J. Collins and church member Keith Moorhouse on drums will lead the music. Eric Palmer on guitar, vocalist Michelle Duralia and other musicians are providing support.

Those attending can begin this fresh expression of worship with a fresh cup of of coffee or tea. Worshippers are invited to gather at 8:15 in Asbury Center for pre-worship refreshments.

The Gathering will run at the same time as the traditional 8:30 service in Sanner Chapel, but it is not replacing that service.

Rev. Scott Miller, Primary Preacher for *The Gathering*



Born in Irwin, PA, Rev. Scott Miller began his life-long association with the United Methodist Church at Charter Oak in Greensburg, PA. It was during a particularly moving moment at CAT Camp at Jumonville in the late 1980s when he first considered entering the ministry. Scott's family moved to S. Carolina, where he completed high school and college, earning a Master's Degree.

Back in W. PA, Scott found a job at U.S. Bank in the

Technology Division, where he is still employed. Exploring his call to ministry, he completed requirements to become a Certified Candidate and graduated from Pastor Licensing School in April, 2018.

Scott is a 20+ year member of Mt. Lebanon United Methodist Church. He and his wife Natalie and daughter Madeline live in the Pittsburgh area. He is also a step father to three adult children.

The Benefits of Giving

"Each one should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." 2 CORINTHIANS 9:7

This fall, I have been preaching on the theme, "Six Practices of Faithful Followers." We've been considering six actions which, if habitually practiced in our lives, will result in spiritual growth for ourselves, and a better world for us all. We soon will have completed all six:

- 1. Talk to God through prayer.
- 2. Be present with and for others.
- 3. Give generously.
- 4. Serve with humility.
- 5. Share your faith.
- 6. Show your gratitude.

All six of these practices are interrelated. I believe that there is a particularly strong connection between #3 and #6. We show our gratitude by the manner in which we give. We're entering a time of the year when "giving" is a major theme. This month it's Thanksgiving, and next month it's Christmas. Both holidays have something to do with giving and receiving good gifts. At Thanksgiving, we give thanks to God, who is ultimately the giver of all that we receive. The Scriptures are clear that the best way to respond to God's generosity is through some generous giving of our own.

Where would our church be today without our forbearers in the faith, whose generous response to God's love has laid the foundation for our faith today? History and Scripture are both very clear — if you want to grow spiritually, you must be generous in your giving to the Lord. This is the best way to give our thanks. "Each of you must give," says Paul, "as each of you has made up your mind." God wants us to grow in trust. God wants us to learn to give. Now is the time of the year to make our pledge of support for God's work through our local church. Please see the instructions elsewhere in this newsletter for making your own pledge. God wants us to risk growth in grace through giving back to God in proportion to God's giving to us. In all areas of your life — your time, your talent, and your finances — if you are currently giving at the five percent level, can you increase it to seven percent? If you are giving at one percent, can you increase to two or three percent? Growth is the hope in the heart of God for you and me! The question for each of us to ask is this: What is the next rung on the spiritual ladder for me? Giving is an act of trust, a goal of trust for you and for me. As we grow in our giving to God, our faith deepens, and we open up new opportunities for spiritual advancement in the years ahead. Do you want to really give thanks this season, and move to a higher level in your spiritual life? Giving is the key which unlocks the door to spiritual growth for each one of us.



Safety

Jesus saves us from sin, death and the devil. He also saves us *for* something. He saves us *for* a life that He himself sustains, protects and guides.

We live in a scary world where bad things happen, even though Jesus is with us. We must be prepared without constantly being afraid. That is why we apply for clearances, take courses in health care and emergency evacuation procedures. We cooperate with the local fire department, use an alarm system and screen visitors who come to the door. We lock the doors behind us. We cannot trust that everyone is a safe person, so we do not prop doors open and walk away.

We cannot live in fear. We walk by faith. We teach children that God is present all the time and that He is stronger than anyone or anything else.

Jesus saved us for a life of sharing. For Thanksgiving, the children are collecting non-perishable food items for the food pantry. Many of the items will be presented as an offering at their chapel service with Pastor Strandburg on the 12th.



Jesus saved us for a life of devotion. The children will be observing Advent activities in which they look forward to the coming of Jesus as the Messiah. They will dress as actors in the Christmas story. They will learn many the traditional songs and hear the accounts from the Bible. Jesus saved us for a life of fellowship. Two of the classes will be creating gingerbread houses for the PPG contest they won last year. A center-wide pajama day with a special hot lunch in celebration of Christmas ending with Happy Birthday Jesus cake will conclude our year on a hopeful, celebratory note.

Church Financial Information

One of the recommendations from our Church stewardship consultant, Scott McKenzie, is more transparency regarding financial matters. The Finance Committee has implemented this recommendation, and began to share quarterly financial information in The Window. To continue this information sharing, summarized below are the Church's 2018 actual financial results, 2019 budget, and 9 month 2019 actual financial results.

As the figures below indicate, 2019 revenues through 9 months were not sufficient to cover expenses. The shortfall worsened in the 3rd quarter due to a drop in stewardship during July and August. Although not unusual, this summer revenue shortfall strained cash flow and challenged timely payment of all bills. Please try to keep your giving current, even when you are not physically in the pews on a given Sunday. Also of note is the status of our Connectional Contribution giving. Although ahead of what had been given last year at this time, we are well short of where we need to be to meet the Conference's ask. Note per the chart below that monies contributed YTD have been from sources other than the Church's general budget. The Finance Committee will continue to discuss ways to address this matter within the context of the Church's overall financial position.

It had been some time since the Church finances were put through an internal review, let alone an external audit. An internal review was completed in July by Anna Jefferies and Joe Catalano (Church members with no involvement in the Church's business or financial activities). Their review, inclusive of several recommendations, was presented to the Finance Committee in August. Said recommendations are now being implemented. Once they are completed, the process of selecting an external auditor to engage in a 2020 audit will begin. Look for information on the planned 2020 audit in a future edition of The Window.
