The Meaning of Unity

"Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose." 1 CORINTHIANS 1:10, NRSV

The text above was the first verse in the Epistle lection that was prescribed in the Revised Common Lectionary for the third Sunday after Epiphany (January 26th, 2020). It sparked a rather lively debate among my clergy friends on Facebook on that Sunday afternoon. How interesting, we all admitted, that God would cause this reading to appear in the lectionary cycle at precisely the moment when our United Methodist denomination is so divided! If you have not yet heard the news, it appears that our 50-year-old denomination is on the verge of a split. Although the current debate pertains to the church's stance on human sexuality – will we perform same-gender marriage ceremonies, and will we ordain LGBTQIA+ persons as clergy – the divisions within our worldwide church are much deeper than just this one issue, important as it might be. At the root of this and other issues dividing our church, is a larger conversation concerning the four basic elements in Methodist decision-making (often referred to as Wesley's Quadrilateral) – scripture, tradition, experience, and reason. The question of how we should understand and interpret these various sources, and the interrelationship between them, is the foundational instability from which all the "cracks" in our denominational wall currently spread.

In the month of May, we will see what our denomination will do, as the General Conference meets in Minneapolis, MN. That conference might well authorize the formation of one or more new successor denominations to the United Methodist Church – at least one "traditionalist denomination" on the issue of human sexuality, and at least one denomination that is more progressive. It will ultimately be up to each local congregation to decide with which denomination it will align itself going forward. In most of the proposed plans, such a decision would be made by a vote of professing members at a local church conference, which would be called to make the decision.

Like the denomination, our local church is profoundly divided on the issues at hand. What is the meaning of "unity" in the midst of such division? In the year 1786, Methodism's founder, John Wesley, preached a sermon entitled, On Schism. He spoke of church splits in blunt terms — "It is evil in itself," he preached. "To separate ourselves from a body of living Christians, with whom we were before united, is a grievous breach of the law of love. ... It is only when our love grows cold, that we can think of separating from our brethren." He was speaking of his own determination that the early Methodist movement should remain a part of the Church of England. However, in the same sermon, he also argues for when a church separation is not only acceptable but demanded by conscience — "Suppose you could not remain in the Church of England without doing something which the word of God forbids, or omitting something which the word of God positively commands; if this were the case, (but blessed be God it is not) you ought to separate from the Church of England," he preached. On both sides of our current debate, persons of conscience believe that separation is regrettably necessary in this case. They might be right.

My concern for our denomination and for our local church runs much deeper than fear of separation. It is the soul-killing side effects of schism that Wesley also identified in his sermon over 230 years ago that really worry me:

"It opens a door to all unkind tempers, both in ourselves and others. It leads directly to a whole train of evil surmising, to severe and uncharitable judging of each other. It gives occasion to offense, to anger and resentment, perhaps in ourselves as well as in our brethren; which, if not presently stopped, may issue in bitterness, malice, and settled hatred; creating a present hell wherever they are found, as a prelude to hell eternal."

Note that the real damage in schism is not to a structure or to an institution, but to the Christian character of those who participate in it. Love is replaced by bitterness, malice, and hatred, creating a kind of "hell on Earth." Might this be what Paul the Apostle was contemplating as he warned the church at Corinth to "be united in the same mind and the same purpose?" Even if we do not all <u>think</u> alike, may we not all <u>love</u> alike? It is this sense of unity of mind and purpose that I hope will be maintained as we move through the challenges of this year together. You can help me in this endeavor in the following ways:

- 1. Pray for our denomination and for our church. May these early months of 2020 be viewed by all of us as a time of spiritual preparation for the important decisions which lay ahead.
- 2. Attend the unity conversations that will be held in the coming months. As you see these advertised in the announcements and newsletter, please make your attendance a priority. Wouldn't it be a shame if we were all called upon to cast a vote for our congregation's future, without ever having the opportunity to hear what is on the collective hearts of our people?
- 3. Remember that Article IV of our United Methodist constitution affirms that "all persons are of sacred worth." Fulfilling the Great Commandment of Jesus to love God as we love our neighbor is not a "conservative issue" or a "progressive issue." It is a Christian issue. It should be an issue around which all of us can rally, even despite our differences.

Do No Harm: A Reconciling Ministries Network Community

The *Do No Harm* group of Mt. Lebanon United Methodist Church has become part of the Reconciling Ministries Network. *Do No Harm* is a community that believes in social justice and in actively applying the Golden Rule to all. It is a discussion group that grew out of concern and opposition to the denomination's LGBTQ ban.

The Reconciling Ministries Network is a national organization of United Methodist individuals, communities and churches who are answering a call to resist harm and reject the anti-LGBTQ legislation of the UMC denomination. Becoming a member of Reconciling Ministries required that *Do No Harm* compose a statement of its beliefs. Here is its statement affirming and welcoming all people:



We embrace, welcome and affirm all persons regardless of age, gender identity, racial or ethnic background, sexual orientation, marital or socioeconomic status, nationality, physical or mental ability into full participation in the life of this community of faith.

We believe that we are all made in God's image and God loves all people. Therefore, we celebrate all persons and work for the end of discrimination, including the ban on same-gender marriage.

We support the ordination of all persons, regardless of gender identity, who are called to serve, and oppose any punishment of clergy for officiating marriage between LGBTQIA+ individuals.

Church members and friends are invited and welcomed to attend a *Do No Harm* meeting. The discussion group meets twice a month on Sunday evenings in the Welcome Center. Look for details in the Sunday announcements.

Church Financial Information

One of the recommendations in early 2017 from our Church stewardship consultant, Scott McKenzie, was more transparency regarding financial matters. The Finance Committee implemented this recommendation in early 2018, and began to share quarterly financial information in The Window. To continue this information sharing, summarized below are the Church's 2018 actual financial results, 2019 budget, and 2019 actual financial results.

As the figures below indicate, 2019 revenues were not sufficient to cover expenses. The shortfall was covered by cash on hand and special gifts. Please note that, as was the case in 2018, the Church did not pay its Connectional Contribution in full. Given the on-going dialogue and debate as to the direction of the United Methodist Church, the Connectional Contributions came solely from unrestricted endowment interest and special gifts - neither cash on hand nor reserves were tapped to fund the gap. This decision was made by the Finance Committee with the knowledge and support of Church Council.

Notwithstanding the denominational uncertainty referenced above, the willingness of the congregation to continue financial support of staff, facilities, and programs through pledged and non-pledged giving is very much appreciated. It would be easy to be distracted by the events happening around us, but fortunately our attention continues to be on the work our Church is doing on a daily basis. Your continuing financial support will help to ensure that our Church stays true to its mission of making those whom it touches disciples of Jesus Christ.

Zwickau is not far from Dresden, Leipzig, and

the nutcracker regions. When we leave Zwickau, we tour a different area of Germany for one or two days. Most people fly back together although a few choose to stay longer.

Many thanks from the Zwickau Committee to all those who attended and supported January's German Schnitzel lunch. Although the Mission Commission and the German lunch funds help support the youth and the total group's transportation costs, it is not too early to consider this trip and start to save as early as possible. Your vision naturally changes as you age but medical conditions can cause additional vision losses at various times of your life. Your vision loss may be a difficulty with either the central or peripheral vision fields. It might be blurred vision, light sensitivity, night blindness, or even a hazy vision. Visit an eye care professional if you have difficulty with: close-up work or reading, determining colors, recognizing friends, reading signs, difficulty completing daily activities. It is important to determine if your problem can be treated with a pair of glasses or if it is disease related requiring surveillance and additional treatment. An early diagnosis of glaucoma, cataracts, macular degeneration or diabetic retinopathy will make a huge difference in managing your vision.
