Rev. Dr. David H. Watson September 23, 1929 - July 6, 2022

"The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, trust worthiness, gentleness, and self-control." Galatians 5

The fruit of the Spirit, exemplified – that is how Bishop George Bashore described his colleague and dear friend, Dr. David Watson at the Celebration of Life Service for David. The Service took place on Saturday, August 20, at Mt. Lebanon United Methodist Church, where Dr. Watson served as an Associate Pastor and a beloved Pastor Emeritus for 43 years. Dr. Watson's colleagues, congregants, friends and family attended, watched online and participated in the love-filled service. The Rev. Dr. David H. Watson died on July 6, at the age of 92.

UMC Pittsburgh District Superintendent Rev. Deborah Ackley-Killian presented the Circuit Rider Medallion on behalf of Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi, the cabinet of the WPA Conference and the congregations and ministries served and impacted by Dr. Watson throughout his sixty-year ministry. Rev. Ackley-Killian spoke of how Dr. Watson and his wife of 69 years, Barbara, had touched her life and those of her family – sharing the sacred Bread and Cup at her late husband Earl's bedside, offering prayers and poems of peace after her husband's death and supporting her daughter Grace in education and call to ministry.

David's four children shared memories of their family life and their father's love and kindness. The family, as well as colleagues, told of joy and amazement in hearing David so often recite poetry, the perfect appropriate verse for the situation at hand. Many speakers reminisced about David's expressive phrases and descriptive language, demonstrating his love of words and sense of humor. When one asked David how he was doing, he answered with a variety of engaging responses, "Couldn't be better – all things considered," "All the better for seeing you," and "Flourishing!"

Rev. Tom Strandburg, worship leader of the service, spoke of the definition of flourishing - to grow or develop in a healthy or vigorous way, especially as a result of a particularly favorable environment. He said of Dr. Watson's work and life, "This man's ministry was all about creating a particularly favorable environment in which all of God's children might flourish and grow. . . The core of the belief system of David Watson could be summarized in the Great Commandment, to love God with heart, soul, mind and strength, and to love your neighbor as yourself; and the Golden Rule, to do unto others as you would have others do unto you."



And as Dr. Watson may have responded, "And all shall be well."

Envisioning the Future

"If people can't see what God is doing, they stumble all over themselves; But when they attend to what God reveals, they are most blessed."

Proverbs 29:18, "The Message"

Proverbs 29:18 is one of the most familiar and oft-quoted verses in the entire Bible. The very traditional rendering in the King James Version states – "Where there is no vision, the people perish." Having a vision means we have a clear sense of purpose. It means we have a much larger picture of our business, or our life, than simply setting and reaching short term goals and tackling problems as they come along. The teacher in Proverbs is undoubtedly right, without such a vision, people perish.

Eugene Peterson's rendering of this famous verse in <u>The Message</u>, as quoted above, has helped to clarify this notion for me. Vision helps us to see what God is doing, and can be doing, in our community and our world. Once we know this, we can then become partners with God in that work. Peterson's book was published almost thirty years ago. There was no way in which he could have been influenced by recent events, or even known of them, since he died in 2018. Which makes the words above even more striking. Has it not been difficult in recent years to "see what God is doing" amid the challenges of pandemic, social division, denominational tension, and their accompanying forces? Yet, this verse extends the promise that when we attend to what God reveals, we shall be blessed.

In recent months, our Church Council has felt that now is the time to spend some time envisioning our future, in light of the realities of the present, but not limited by them. We have begun to ask ourselves questions like: What kind of a church is God calling us to be in the years ahead? What are the current needs in our community, and how can we act to meet those needs? How can we work even more effectively in each of the five areas of focus, as identified by and affirmed by the United Methodist churches in Western Pennsylvania – develop principled Christian leaders, renew our congregation, engage in ministry with the poor, promote abundant health, and dismantle racism? We have reached out to Rev. Larry Homitsky of United Methodist Church Union to serve as our facilitator in this task. The result will be a blueprint for action in the months and years ahead. I would encourage you to watch this space in coming months for reports of our progress. I would also encourage you to respond with your presence and support as you have the opportunity in the days ahead. Continue to pray daily for the Lord's work through the Mt. Lebanon United Methodist Church!

Acknowledging Discrimination, Fighting Racism, and Seeking Justice for All

"The United Methodist Church recognizes that the sin of racism has been destructive to its unity throughout its history. Racism continues to cause painful division and marginalization. The United Methodist Church shall confront and seek to eliminate racism, whether in organizations or in individuals, in every facet of its life and in society at large. The United Methodist Church shall work collaboratively with others to address concerns that threaten the cause of racial justice at

all times and in all places." (UMC literature)

Since 2020 when our church council approved a proposal to focus on acknowledging discrimination, fighting racism, and seeking justice for all, various church members and groups have done a great many things to forward this cause. All the adult Sunday Schools have had classes on racism and discrimination. The Do No Harm Committee has hosted a number of programs. Our volunteer Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion leader has made a strong connection with ART (The Pittsburgh Anti-Racism Team.) We have had several church-wide book discussions on racism and discrimination. The Community Events and Outreach Committee has reached out to many groups in the community including Hello Neighbor which helps refugees and SHIM. We have made connections with St. Paul's AME, Beulah Baptist Church, and Warren Methodist Church.

Recently, church council voted to renew this focus by passing the following proposal: Proposal: Renew our 2020 Focus to dismantle discrimination, eliminate racism and foster justice for all throughout our community and the world. We propose to support this focus with education and a variety of action items below. We will expand MLUMC's understanding and capacity to serve those in need or hurt, especially due to sexism, race or economic status. By name and intention this includes our black brothers and sisters, POC (People of Color) and members of the LGBTQIA+ community.

In addition to continuing the work that is already being done, we have generated a list of possible "To-Do's" which individuals and committees may consider. For example, there will be more book discussions. Titles include, "Color of Compromise" and "Inspired." DNH will have movie nights. We will continue connecting with African American Churches. We will continue our relationship with the Pittsburgh Ant-Racist Team. The Community Outreach will continue with its work. .On September 4, at the Unity Sunday School meeting, more ideas will be discussed.

Church Financial Information

One of the recommendations in early 2017 from our Church stewardship consultant, Scott McKenzie, was more transparency regarding financial matters. The Finance Committee implemented this recommendation in early 2018 and began to share quarterly financial information in The Window. Pursuant to this recommendation, summarized below are the Church's 2021 actual, 2022 budgeted, and 2022 second quarter financial results.

The 2022 budget projects a deficit of almost \$100,000, assuming payment in full of the Connectional Contribution. This is the latest in a series of negative budgets approved by the Finance Committee and Church Council. A balanced 2022 budget would require more revenues and/or less expenses – both are easier said than done. Although the second quarter numbers (if annualized) look favorable compared to the budget, such would still result in a bottom-line deficit and significant shortfall in the Connectional Contribution payment.

As we move into the third quarter and beyond, it will be imperative for pledgers to keep up with their pledges and for non-pledged givers to contribute on a regular basis. In 2021, the combination of many pledgers falling behind in their giving and fluctuations in non-pledged giving created significant cash flow challenges throughout late summer and early fall. It is hoped that such can be avoided in 2022.

Community Events & Outreach Committee

Financial Partners Needed

Many events such as Lenten Fish Fries sponsored by the Community Events and Outreach Committee are self-sustaining, with free will donations covering event costs. However, this is not always the case.

As the Committee continues with its 2022 activities, there is an opportunity for members of the congregation to play a major role in ensuring their success. By becoming a "financial partner" of the Committee, you will not only help to underwrite the activities, but also be given the opportunity to assist with them.

Throughout this year, the Committee plans to get back to a pre-pandemic schedule of community meals. While free will donations may cover most event costs, having support from financial partners for these events enables the frequency of them to be increased. Current Committee activities are: 1) providing backpacks filled with school supplies to children/grandchildren of our Food Pantry clients, St. Paul AME church members, and Beulah Baptist church members; and 2) providing baby and toddler supplies to Hello Neighbor and SHIM, social service organizations that assist refugees and immigrants. These backpacks and supplies are funded primarily by individual donations. Having "financial partners" in place ensures that activities such as these continue to occur.

Enrollment is good, teachers are happy and the children are learning and growing. Amen

In Jesus Revealed: The I Am Statements in the Gospel of John, author Matt Rawle explores the "I Am" statements in John as works of art that resonate throughout the Gospel and all of Scripture. He shows how these words point beyond themselves to the deep mystery of Jesus Christ.
