

A Reading from the First Letter of John

I JN. 5:1-6

Amen.



"The Music Note"

As Mr. Stecker prepares to go to Germany to lead the inaugural Summer Church Music Workshop through our Zwickau partnership, the preludes and postludes over the coming weeks are all along the theme of "Zwicksburgh", celebrating the music of composers from both of our hometowns. This morning, the prelude is an organ transcription of a choral work by Nancy Galbraith. The original work was written on the occasion of the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, and is a setting of a prayer by Philip Melanchthon. Professor Galbraith, a native of Millvale, is a prolific and highly accoladed composer, and holds the Vira I. Heinz endowed chair in the College of Fine Arts, Carnegie Mellon University.

The postlude this morning is by Johann Ludwig Krebs, a favorite student of J.S. Bach's, for whom Bach had such high esteem that he once called him "the only crayfish [krebs] in my stream [bach]". Krebs wrote in a style very similar to that of his teacher, to the extent that many works once attributed to Bach are now thought by scholars to more likely have been written by Krebs. Krebs was for many years the organist at St. Mary's (Lutheran) Church in Zwickau, not far from the Friedenskirche.
